ENGAGEMENT FROM A DISTANCE

During this challenging time when we are all separated by distance, it is even more important now than ever to nurture a sense of belonging. Creating opportunities for youth to connect is paramount.

- Set up time for youth to face time or video chat with another 4-H member in the Club. They could check in once a week, and learn more about each other and each other's project work.
 - What are the top 2 things that happened today?
 - What are you looking forward to tomorrow?
 - What are you reading?
 - What kind of a person were you today?
 - ♦ Teach me something I don't know.
 - What is one thing you would change about your day?
 - What made you feel happy today?
 - What made you smile today?
 - What made you feel proud?

The above questions are from "50 Questions to Get Your Kids Talking" from Her View From Home.

- Create opportunities for youth to work on a project together (via distance); maybe it is a demonstration for the club, project work, helping each other with their fair exhibits, etc.
- Have youth record and share a demonstration on your Club's Facebook page.

Beginning August 21, 2020 families will not be able to login to 4HOnline until early September 2020 when 4HOnline 2.0 opens.





Community Service Corner Simple Acts of Kindness

Community service is an important part of the 4-H program. Research tells us 4-H youth are 3-4 times more likely to contribute to their communities compared to youth in other out-of-school programs (4-H Study of Positive Youth Development). Below are some community service ideas on things EVERY-ONE can do that are Simple Acts of Kindness to spread goodwill...

- Do something nice for a family member to let them know you love them, like doing the dishes, helping with laundry, cleaning the bathroom.
- Send a thank you note to your teacher, your 4-H Club Leader, a farmer, a grocery store clerk or stocker.
- Create cards or drawings to brighten someone's day. These could be mailed to a local retirement home, a hospital worker, or any other person/ place you think could use a pick me up.



ESSENTIAL ELEMENTS OF 4-H

In 4-H, the critical components of a successful learning experience are a sense of Belonging, Independence, Mastery, and Generosity. Throughout the 4-H experience, youth are engaged and participate in activities that encourage and provide growth in each of these areas. The 4-H Essential Elements are embedded through the learning experience. Creating a sense of...

Belonging

- 1. Continue to encourage youth to get to know each other, even during this time of social distancing.
- 2. If you are having virtual meetings, still do a roll call, and use questions to help youth learn about each other's home life.
- 3. Use ideas from previous column to encourage youth to connect.
- 4. Ask youth what they might like to do to create a sense of connection and belonging to the 4-H program.

Mastery

- 1. Youth serve as project leaders or committee chairs and officers.
- 2. Have youth lead a project meeting for other youth in the Club. These could be done live or recorded with technology. Asking youth to develop a project meeting plan, list of supplies and directions prior to the meeting, so youth attending the project meeting can follow along.
- 3. If youth are enrolled in animal projects, ask them to share a demonstration, showmanship or other live animal class via technology with their animals.

<u>Independence</u>

- Youth select their own projects and set their project goals as well as having opportunities to share their opinions and experiences.
- 2. Encourage youth to present and record a demonstration and post it on your club's Facebook page.
- 3. Provide opportunities for as many youth as possible to share their input. Create polls, use chats, posts to keep youth engaged in decision making, and ideas to keep the Club or project group moving forward.

Generosity

- Participate in community service projects, or serve as a mentor/buddy for a new 4-H member.
- 2. Have younger members and older members be Clover Pals. Clover Pals can work together during meetings, activities, on projects and much more. Have Clover Pals check in with each other once a week.
- 3. Ask youth to think about ways they can continue to do community service via distance. Thank you cards, picking up trash as they take walks outside, food drive from your pantry to donate to local food pantry, etc.
