2021 Wisconsin 4-H Foundation Scholarship- Due March 15, 2021

The Wisconsin 4-H Foundation will award more than \$15,000 in scholarships to outstanding Wisconsin 4-H members and alumni pursuing higher education in 2021. To be considered for financial support, applications must be received by the Wisconsin 4-H Foundation via email by Monday, March 15, 2021.

Wisconsin 4-H Foundation scholarships are awarded to students based on demonstrated personal growth through 4-H, development and leadership in 4-H, academic performance and future educational goals.

To be eligible for Wisconsin 4-H Foundation scholarships students must have:

- been a Wisconsin 4-H member for at least three • years
- have a grade point average of at least 2.5 on a 4.0 scale
- be enrolled or planning to enroll at a university, college or technical school during the 2021-2022 academic school year.

Scholarship winners from previous years are not eligible to receive a second 4-H Foundation scholarship.

The application is a one-page resume and a one page cover letter, both of which give the 4-H youth a chance to share their 4-H achievements, as well as their future plans. Applicants are asked to treat this process as if applying for a job.

A panel of experienced youth educators will screen the applications and select finalists. Applications chosen as finalists will be ranked by a second panel comprised of 4-H and youth development experts. The 4-H Foundation will assign available scholarships to the top-ranking applications based on scholarship criteria.

Applicants who are awarded scholarships will be notified by postal letter and email in May.



2021 Green Lake County Fair Livestock Auction Participation Requirements



If you are planning on participating in the 2021 Green Lake County Fair Livestock Auction, make sure you familiarize yourself with the auction participation requirements set by the Green Lake County Livestock Council. This information can be found in more detail on the Green Lake County 4-H website under the "Livestock Council" tab.

Participation requirements:

- Complete livestock tagging information form by March 1
- Beef, sheep, and swine tagging completed by April 30

- Youth's family must sign up for a Livestock Council responsibility by May 1 and complete the responsibility.
- Complete annual YQCA certification by July 1
- By the Green Lake County Fair Mandatory Meeting (July 29), attend at least one Livestock Council meeting OR attend an educational experience. There is a list of virtual educational programs that would meet this requirement. If you participate in an educational experience for this requirement you must complete and submit a program evaluation form.

Green Lake County Fair Livestock Auction Tagging Form– Due March 1

March 1 Deadline! If you are planning to enter a market animal in the Green Lake County Fair Livestock Auction, then you must complete the tagging form located online at <u>glc4h.org</u> under the "Livestock Council" tab.

Even if you are only thinking about entering a market animal, you should complete the form.

There will be a \$10 LATE FEE, per species, per exhibitor, per month charged on all late entries (late entries accepted until tagging is completed in April). These fees must be paid prior to your animals being tagged. Make checks for late entries payable to: Green Lake County Livestock Council and mailed to 571 County Road A Green Lake, WI 54941.

Wisconsin State Fair tags- We know that some of you tag your animals with State Fair tags and that is acceptable at the Green Lake County Fair Auction. We would still like to know that you are interested in participating in the Green Lake County Fair Livestock Auction so we still ask you to complete this form and indicate that no Green Lake County tags are needed.

The maximum number of tagged animals per exhibitor/per species is eight, which includes State Fair tags.


Spaghetti Engineering

"Season's Greetings"

Wildlife WHEP & Forestry 4-H Friends,

The year is wrapping up and hopefully many of you were able to use some unexpected free time to pursue your wildlife interests!

There is already a thin layer of ice on the pond down the road. I often see turtles sunning themselves on logs throughout the year but I wondered what they do as the weather turns. Turtles instinctively know how to prepare for winter. When air and water temperatures start to drop, turtles will slow their metabolisms and look for a place to hole up for winter. Different types of turtles prefer different types of homes: water-loving turtles will swim to the bottom of the pond while land-

based turtles, like a box turtle will burrow in the dirt or mud at or near the pond surface. Just like fish, turtles will stop eating as their metabolism naturally slows to a cold-weather crawl. They'll start to hibernate - or brumate, as termed in herpatology - when they'll require very little oxygen, their heart rate will slow to just a few beats per minute and they'll sleep the winter away. Did you read about the bears spotted in Richfield on November 17? (HOMEWORK - Where is Richfield?) OWisconsin's occupied bear range is expanding, which means residents can expect to see black bears in areas outside of the bear's traditional range. Wisconsin's black bear population is considerably higher than it was 30 years ago. The female black bear can weigh up to two hundred pounds. The male is larger weighing in at around four hundred pounds. Their height and length are around the same amount for both sexes. The height averages around three feet up to the shoulders and the length is approximately four to six feet. They typically hibernate from September through April. Black bears have excellent vision and are good swimmers. They can live to be thirty-three years old. Source: <u>Black bear population status and distribution |</u> <u>Wisconsin DNR</u>

Registration is required by mailing this form & payment by February 15th, 2021. We will email you a photo submission form upon receipt of your registration & payment. Your completed submission form must be emailed by February 28, 2021.

This 4-H activity open to all Wisconsin 4-H Club members. <u>You may be enrolled in any 4-H project to</u> participate. See additional guidelines and wildlife/forestry art contest rules for all classes.

<u>"Brief Description Required – on your submission form" – All items must have completed the "story telling" description area (counts 30% toward award) explaining your item and its wildlife or forestry connection. Items must be made in the current 4-H project year and after September 1st of the previous year. No commercial craft kits or similar are allowed. Judges will use their own discretion and no challenges are allowed. Limit - THREE ITEMS.</u>

Separate Classes & Current Grade (January 2021): K5, 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, 12, 13

1-Nesting Structure or Feeder for Bird, Bee, Butterfly, or Bat House, etc. – The structure meets specific requirements for the named critter. Include - overall size, shape, and hole diameter or opening, etc.. (Ornamental bird houses, etc. must be entered in crafts.) Include your story telling description.

2-Craft – Craft item has wildlife or forestry connection. Examples: leather craft, stitchery, clothing, sculpture, wildlife folk art, plaster tracks, quiver, etc. Craft items must be made by exhibitor during the current 4-H year. (Do not use "put together craft kits" or similar items.)

3-Drawing – Drawing can be any size and does not need to be mounted that has a wildlife, forestry, or wildlife habitat connection. Drawing can be pencil, ink, charcoal, chalk, pastel, colored pencil or similar on any surface. Drawing will be judged on "story telling ability", neatness, and your description.

4-Invasive Plant or Weed – Poster, display, or dried example of an invasive plant or weed (immature and mature if possible). Include item name, your description, and control measures. Also, include date & location where found for each item for actual collections. This entry may include items from the <u>entire preceding calendar year</u>. Examples: purple loosestrife, ragweed, etc. Include your story telling description.

5-Orienteering & Geocaching – Poster or display on Compass, GPS, or Topographic Map Use. Items will be judged on their relationship to wildlife or forestry applications. Poster or display related to geocaching. Include your story telling description.

6-Painting – Your painting can be any size and does not need to be mounted that has a wildlife or forestry connection. Painting can be acrylic, watercolor, oil, or similar on any surface. Painting will be judged on "story telling ability", neatness and your description.

7-Photo Black & White – Your black & white photo or silhouette photo (one photo only) can be any size and does not need to be mounted that has a wildlife or forestry connection. Photo will be judged on "story telling ability", neatness, and your description. No people allowed.

8-Photo Color – Your color photo (one only), any size, and does not need to be mounted that has a wildlife or forestry connection. Photo will be judged on "story telling ability", neatness, and your brief description. No people allowed.

9-Recycle – Any item related to wildlife, forestry, or for wildlife use. Example – bird nesting material. Item will be judged on "story telling ability", practical usefulness, neatness, and your brief description.

10-Taxidermy – Item or display made 4-H member during the current 4-H year. Include date, location, and county where critter was obtained. Also, include a description of the critter and of your taxidermy work.

11-Trail Camera Photo – Large / Small Mammal – Photo from a trail camera can be any size and does not need to be mounted. Include animal name, date, location (county), and brief description of the picture. Also include the relationship of the camera's owner. Picture must have been taken with your immediate family or grandparents trail camera after September 1st of the previous year. Photos will be judged on "story telling ability", neatness, and your description.

12-Trail Camera Photo – Upland Bird, Backyard Bird, Waterfowl, or Raptor – Photo from a trail camera can be any size and does not need to be mounted. Include animal name, date, location (county), and brief description of the picture. Also include the relationship of the camera's owner. Picture must have been taken with your immediate family or grandparents trail camera <u>after September 1st of the previous year</u>. Photos will be judged on "story telling ability", neatness, and your description.

13-Tree or Shrub – Item, poster or display of a tree or shrub, parts, measurements, related insects, or diseases, etc. Include the tree/shrub name and description. Also, can be with an animal, insect, bird, or critter that makes their home in, on, or near a particular tree or shrub species. This entry may include items from the entire preceding calendar year.

14-WHEP or Forestry Concept – Item, diorama, poster, or display of a WHEP or forestry Concept (or part of a concept) from the current national manuals. Include the concept name and a description. Examples: habitat requirements, stages, food chain, etc.

15-WHEP Foods – Item, diorama, poster, or display of a WHEP foods (or part of a food group) from the current national WHEP manual. Include the food group name and a description. Examples: aquatic plants, grains, soft mast, hard mast, etc.

16-WHEP or Forestry Management Practice – Item, diorama, poster, or display of a WHEP Management Practice (or part of a management practice) from the current national WHEP Manual. Include management practice name and you. description Examples: planting trees, fish or wildlife survey, create snags, wildlife damage management, recreational uses, products, tools used, etc.

17-Wildflower – Dried or pressed wildflowers, poster or display of wildflowers or parts of a wildflower. Include name, date, location (county) where found and your description. This entry may include items from the entire preceding calendar year.
