4-H Charter SMART Goals – Fun Productive Meetings

Sometimes our meetings are fantastic, fulfilling and fun; and other times, we miss the mark. It helps to know what fun means for your group. Each gathering is different depending on who shows, what their moods are and even what the weather does.

If you are one of the 158 clubs and groups who selected having "productive, meaningful, and fun

meetings" as their SMART goal in their charters, you'll want to start by defining the goals of the day with your group and how they want to achieve them. Here are some resources to help!

Start your meetings with a helpful mood check-in. Connecting with those in attendance will help boost participation and the warm fuzzies throughout the meeting. Try the Sit Down If... game: Everyone stands in a circle. The leader gives silly demands to get us warmed up. Sit down if you ate cheese today! Those who did, sit, and remain seated. The last person standing gets to make the next round of demands. Next round the leader makes more probing requests: Sit down if you are tired, bored, anxious, hungry, excited, or somewhere else today. Kids can see who is feeling just like them without having to say a thing. Then ask, what should we do about this? See what the kids come up with, and try something out!

Maintaining flexibility and lowering your expectations can actually have surprising results. For more information on this read "The Surprising Power of Giving Up Choice Control". Sometimes our vision of productivity needs a little tweaking in order to be productive for the youth, too. When you are willing to adapt, the youth will bring the momentum!

Don't forget to measure your productivity and fun – how will you know if you succeed? Easy ways to measure this goal is to mark attendance, survey members of your club, and take notes of when youth engaged in leadership activities. Then celebrate the milestones you make with this one!

4-H Area Animal Science Days – Registration due June 1

Save the date for WI 4-H Area Animal Science Days! We will have two host sites this year. A big THANK YOU to Sheboygan County for hosting on June 15th and Chippewa County for hosting on June 17th. Watch your e-mail, social media, and the state 4-H website for more information about registration information and the offerings at each host site along.

What is Area Animal Science Day? Area Animal Science Days is a series of two day-long events held around the state in June where youth in the beef,

dairy, sheep, and swine projects increase their decision-making skills and knowledge of animals through judging and grading experiences. Events include evaluation of dairy cattle, and meat animals; dairy showmanship contests; and presenting oral reasons. One of the awesome things about youth judging is that it flips your typical animal show experience. Often you are in the ring and a judging is telling you why they placed the animals the way they did. This gives you the opportunity to place a class and the reasons why you placed a class the way you saw it. In addition, each site may offer a variety of workshops for horses, rabbits, poultry, or other species. Stay tuned for more information about those additional offerings.

Who can participate? Any current 4-H members ages in grades 3-13. Even if your county has not participated in the past, round-up some 4-H friends and take advantage of this fun opportunity to show your knowledge of the horse species and industry.

Please note, there are age divisions for each of those contests. See the contest information at the State 4-H Website – Area Animal Science Day for more information on the age divisions. Divisions: Junior – Age 8-13 as of January 1, 2022; Senior – Age 14-18 as of January 1, 2022. WI 4-H members that are in the 13th grade and have reached their 19th birthday prior to January 1, 2022 are eligible to compete at the AASD contests and state contest as individuals but not as a member of a team. Youth must be in or completed 3rd grade, 8 year old Cloverbuds cannot participate. Please check on rules of each contest for more information

Do I need judge with my county? You do need to register to compete for the county you are enrolled in. You can always practice with other counties (some awesome coaches help a few counties) but when it comes to contest time you need to compete for your county.

What if my county doesn't have a team? If your county doesn't have a team, you can still take part as an individual. If you aren't sure if your county has a team, check with your local county 4-H educator for more information.

Open Communication in Youth-Adult Partnerships

Having open communication between people of different age groups can be rewarding but also really challenging. One of our volunteers asked a great question – How do I tell a member no, nicely? We don't want to stamp out or dismiss an idea or suggestion that maybe took a lot of courage from someone to announce and yet, we can't do everything.

One way to embrace their suggestion and yet help them see the limitations of it is to explore their idea further with more questions (which is called the socratic method!). How would we go about making this happen? Do we have the resources to make this realistic or achievable? What can we use from this idea to still make some part of it work? Does this idea follow the rules or policies we need to in order to be safe? If you get stuck for questions, think of a analysis strengths, weaknesses, SWOT opportunities, threats to help inspire. Keep asking questions until the group reaches an understanding or a plan of action.

Embracing the idea and using it as a teaching moment for both of you and the group, accepts the idea-giver and acknowledges the idea as valid, and it also shows the idea-giver how to do more critical thinking while also gently guiding them to an understanding that it might not be possible. You aren't telling them no, but helping them see all the facets themselves of what goes into their idea, and sometimes that can be illuminating. Don't forget that going through this process can enlighten you too – this idea might actually work!

It's also a good idea to take into consideration the age of the youth, their stage in development and the needs, challenges and characteristics they might have. For that, check out this great handout from the Missouri 4-H:

3rd Annual WI 4-H Service Learning Project

The 3rd Annual Wisconsin Service Learning Project is called Community Marks the Spot. It's a place-based project where youth can highlight something about their community that's important to them. Place-based projects are hands-on, real-world learning experiences. They help youth:

- Connect with their community.
- Appreciate the natural world.
- See themselves as active contributing citizens.
- Do better in school.

What It Is: In this project, youth will plan a non-competitive game that takes players to different locations around their community, like a scavenger hunt. The locations they choose will highlight a special theme the youth want to learn more about, strengthening their sense of belonging and ownership in their community.

What We'll Learn: This project will help youth and community members connect with their geography, appreciate and respect the natural world, see themselves as active contributing citizens, and learn skills in planning and organizing events.

This project is highly adaptable and flexible to the themes, needs, and resources that each community has. It will help youth apply critical thinking to involving the larger public needs in events, as well as, provide a real-world, hands-on activity that can bring experiential awareness to whatever focus youth feel important. It's a great opportunity for youth-adult partnerships!
