4-H OPPORTUNITIES

4-H Record Books are Important!

I want to start by saying that record books were probably my least favorite part of being in 4-H! And I know my daughters did not enjoy doing them either. HOWEVER, I truly believe in the importance of record books.

As many seniors know, scholarship applications frequently ask applicants to list their: Activities, Awards/ Achievements, Leadership, and Community Service. We live in a society where accurate and organized records are a necessity. Many jobs involve reporting what we've done. If youth learn to keep accurate records, it will help youth later on with managing money, a checkbook, or a business. Record books will also help youth think through goals and how much you have accomplished. Completing record books prepare youth for scholarship and job applications and help youth develop skills for life.

Reflecting on your year of learning is a huge part of being a 4-H member, and summer will (hopefully) provide time for you to think about all of the great 4-H activities and achievements you have done over the last year.

Make sure you keep track of what you've done either on the calendar or in a notebook so when it comes time to do that record book, you are halfway there! Each county has a different format for record books, but most have some similarities.

What Should I Put in My Record Book?

- General information
- My 4-H Story
- Financial Records
- Project records goals and what you learned

Be sure you have all the required records for your project.

What Should I Leave Out of My Record Book?

- Last year's records. (Except when you are graduating out of 4-H and want to apply for the "Achievement Award." All of your records are judged on this award).
- Ribbons, letters, certificates, program booklets, score sheets, do NOT belong — keep these for a scrapbook.

What Makes a Good Record Book?

- 1. Neatness Use a computer or write with the same color ink; print if you can.
- 2. Completeness Anyone reading your record book should be able to tell exactly what you did in your project work and what you learned. Don't leave us guessing because you didn't explain well enough. Essay form (complete sentences and paragraphs) is fine. You may also use an outline form. If there is a question on your record sheets that you can't answer, write "does not apply."
- 3. Accuracy It is important that the work and learning you report was actually done by you.

What Can I do to Make My Record Book a Little More Special?

- 1. Newspaper clippings (be sure the story is about you and your project/activity). Underline your name and your club's name.
- 2. Photographs pictures that show you working on a project or that help to explain what you have done, are fine. Remember: The pictures must be part of your project work a record book is not a photo album.

Get started on those record books to help tell your 4-H story!

Green Lake County 4-H Record Books- Due September 9

It is hard to believe that with summer just beginning, fall will be here before we know it! With Fall comes a time for 4-H families to take the opportunity to think about the past year and plan for the year ahead. One of the ways we do this is by completed a 4-H Record Book.

The 4-H program has a long history of record keeping. The focus reflects the importance of this life skill in our daily lives. In 4-H, young people have tracked their activities, events, profits and losses, skill development and learning experiences, and much more using the iconic 4-H Record Book. In addition to record keeping, the 4-H Record Book gives members an opportunity to reflect on their year, measure their achievements and growth, and set goals, and develop plans to meet those goals. 4-H Record Books are completed annually and reflect on the 4-H year (October- September).

Cloverbuds have a special record book to complete, if they choose to do one. It can include photos, drawings, and written thoughts about what you liked in 4-H over the past year. Parents and older siblings are encouraged to help Cloverbuds get started on their record book.

Club leaders and older youth are GREAT resources for completing 4-H Record Books! All Green Lake County 4-H members are encouraged to complete a 4-H Record Book.

4-H Record Book pages are available on the Green Lake County 4-H website, with a link on the homepage taking you directly there. Here you can also find a video going through the 4-H Record Book and each of the sections.

The Extension Office has 3-ring binders to put your 4-H Record Book pages inside. If you need a binder, please contact Kathy (kathy.ninneman@wisc.edu) at the Extension Office.

4-H Record Books are turned into your club leader to be evaluated at the club level and then may be nominated to be considered for a county level award. Please check with your club leader to learn your club's due date and the process for getting your Record Book to your club leader to be evaluated.

All Record Books that would like to be considered for county level awards are due to the Extension Office by September 9.

DATCP Lifts State Order Prohibiting Poultry at Live Events- June 20, 2022

The Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection (DATCP) announces that the statewide order prohibiting movement of poultry to all live events has been lifted. The order had been in effect since May to prevent the spread of highly pathogenic avian influenza (HPAI) in Wisconsin.

While poultry is now permitted at live events, DATCP continues to encourage strong biosecurity practices including cleaning and disinfecting, restricting access by visitors and wild birds, and keeping separate shoes and clothes to wear around flocks. Since March, 22 domestic flocks in 14 Wisconsin counties have been confirmed with the virus, and states continue to identify new infections at backyard and commercial farms.

Poultry owners should continue monitoring their birds for increased mortality or signs of illness. Reports can be submitted to DATCP at (608) 224-4872 (business hours) or (800) 943-0003 (after hours and weekends).

DATCP also reminds poultry owners to register their premises

(https://datcp.wi.gov/Pages/Programs Services/PremisesRegistration.aspx). State law requires that all livestock owners register where their animals are kept, and registration helps animal health officials communicate with flock owners during disease outbreaks.

Fair Entry Tag Pick Up

Fair entry tags can be picked up on Thursday, July 28 at Fair Set Up Night from 6:30-8:30 p.m. at the Fair Office on the fairgrounds. Securely attach the entry tags to projects before arrival at the fair. Remove and keep the bottom portion of the entry tag, it is your claim check when picking up your items on Sunday evening. Club booth tags will be stapled to the designated booth at the fair. Check the tag when decorating to ensure you have the correct booth.

2022 Fair Theme "Blue Jeans and County Fair Dreams"

Please try to carry out this theme in the barn decorations! There are many ways to use this theme in decorating ideas- use your imagination!

Entry Day- Tuesday, August 2

All non-animal exhibits will be judged face-to-face during Pre-Fair Judging on Tuesday, August 2. All Junior Class judging will begin at 9:00 am.

Livestock In-Place and Weigh-In-Wednesday, August 3

Animals in Place:

- Beef, Sheep, and Swine must be in place by 1:00 p.m.
- Poultry and Rabbits must be in place by 6:00 p.m.
- Dairy and Goats must be in place by 9:00 p.m.

Weigh in times:

- Sheep, 1:00p.m.-1:30p.m.
- Swine, 2:00p.m.-3:00p.m.
- Beef, 3:00 p.m.-4:00p.m.

All sheep and goats must have an official scrapies ear tag. Sheep and goats may not be removed from the trailer until the sheep superintendents verify that a tag is present.

All swine exhibitors must have their swine health papers turned in to the swine superintendent before unloading. Hogs must be checked within 30 days prior to the fair by a veterinarian.

Fair Mandatory Meetings

The Mandatory Meetings are for all exhibitors showing beef, swine, sheep, rabbits, poultry, horses, dairy, and goats. Participation will be mandatory to show at the Fair.

Mandatory meeting dates/times are as follows:

- Horses: Thursday, July 28, 7:00-7:30 pm in the fairgrounds horse arena
- Beef/Sheep/Swine/Rabbits/Poultry/Dairy: Thursday, July 28, 7:30 pm in the fairgrounds Sheep/Swine barn.
- Dogs: Tuesday, August 2, 5:30 pm at the fairgrounds

Fair Awards Program

The Awards Program is on Sunday, August 7 at 12:30 p.m. under the Event Tent. If you received a

special award, please plan to attend, as you will not be receiving any notification in the mail.

Fair Set-Up Night

Thursday, July 28 from 6:30pm-8:30pm Fair exhibitors, families, and supporters are asked to help clean and set-up the exhibition building at the Fairgrounds. The Fair Office will have a posted task list.

Release of Fair Entries

All fair exhibits (including animals, some may be released earlier) will be released at 5:00 p.m. on Sunday, August 7. The Exhibition Building will close at 4:45 p.m. to allow staff to set up tables and arrange for exhibit release. No exhibits may be taken from the Exhibition Building prior to the building's reopening at 5:00 p.m.

Barn Information at the Fair

- Stall assignments: will be ready at Fair Set-up Night.
- Bedding: All exhibitors are required to provide their own bedding at the fair. Sawdust is preferred and recommended.
- Decorating: Clubs are responsible for bringing their own supplies to decorate their club areas in the barns (staplers, markers, tape, scissors, etc.). The Fair Office will not lend out supplies. When decorating or hanging anything in the barns, please be extremely careful. This includes making sure that no nails or other potentially hazardous materials fall where any animals or people may be harmed by them, including neighboring feed areas. For the safety of all exhibitors and livestock, use discretion in decorating.
- Closing time for all barns: 10:00 p.m. Exhibitors are to have cared for animals and exited the buildings by this time.

Beautify the Fair

The Fair is asking all clubs that are interested in helping to "beautify" the Fairgrounds to bring in flower planters/displays this year to have on display outside the animal barns. Planters can be decorated to reflect the fair theme, or can be your favorite planter you've been growing all summer! Here is your chance to really show off your creative talents! Promote your club or activity and help make the fair-grounds a beautiful place. Participants will need to furnish all the supplies and to keep it watered during the fair, if needed.
